## **SMD Elections**

SMD nominating committee chair person Paul Mahoney is accepting names for persons wishing to be officers for the 2017-2018 term. Open positions are for superintendent, clerk, and paymaster. A review of our bi-laws [available at smdnmra.org; excerpt below -Ed.] will explain these one year term positions that begin on 1 July.

Article XIII Terms of Office, Nominations, and Elections

- 1. The Superintendent and Clerk-Paymaster will serve one-year terms.
- 2. No one may fill more than one elected position simultaneously except for brief transition periods.
  - 3. In preparation for each year's annual meeting and election, the Nominating Committee will solicit candidates, explaining the requirements of the position. In addition, any three members may nominate someone via a written notice to the Nominating Committee, with the permission of the nominee. Such nominations must be submitted to the Nominating Committee at least thirty days ahead of the election.
  - 4. The names of the candidates for office will be communicated to the

membership at least fifteen days before the election.

- 5. If contested, the election will be conducted by the Nominating Committee Chair at the annual meeting via secret ballot. Ballots will be counted and results announced before the close of the meeting. Positions will be filled by a simple plurality of votes.
- 6. Members elected will take office on July 1.
- 7. In case of a vacancy in an elected position (article VIII), a special election can be held at any Division meeting. Special elections must be held in accordance with the rules defined above.

The committee would like all nominations at the upcoming, 12 March meeting. It is expected that due to the Mini Con elections will be deferred to the 21 May meeting. If you are interested in serving, please contact Paul Mahoney [paulmahoney2@gmail.com -Ed.].





# The Susquehannock Is Coming!

2017 MER Convention Sponsored by The Susquehanna Division October 12 – 15, 2017 www.mer2017.org

The name Susquehannock appears to have originated as an Algonquin name meaning the "people of the Muddy River" (Susquehanna). Their territory ranged along the Susquehanna River and its branches from the north end of Chesapeake Bay in Maryland across Pennsylvania into southern New York, very much the area encompassed by our Susquehanna division.

Moving forward, the Pennsylvania Railroad chose to name its passenger train which ran from Williamsport to Philadelphia "The Susquehannock." Wanting to know more about this train I went to Jerry Britton's Keystone Crossings website



www.pennsyrr.com to look at consist lists. The April 28, 1957 edition gives the list as; (1) B60, Mail-Baggage-Express Messenger, (1) P70CGSR, Coach, and (1) PL, Parlor Car – Buffet10 Table seats – 24 Coach Seats. On the trip to Philadelphia the B60 was dropped at Harrisburg and the Coach and Parlor Car were attached to train #604. And on the return trip train #605 The Coach and Parlor Car were added to the B60 for the remainder of the trip to Williamsport.

The more we explore the name the more it applies to our event. The name Susquehannock and the Susquehanna Division makes this an obvious choice. The PRR route was from Philadelphia to Harrisburg, then on to Williamsport following the Susquehanna River, thus specifically designed to service the area our division services. And finally it is the perfect prototype to model, no selective compression required. So, there you have it, some very good reasons why our convention became THE SUSQUEHANNOCK!

The convention will be held at the Sheraton Harrisburg-Hershey Hotel. Our hotel is convenient to both the Harrisburg International Airport and the Harrisburg Amtrak (former Pennsylvania RR) Station. Tours aimed at both rail and non-rail interests will be offered. For our rail fans, tours of

East Broad Top Railroad, American Car and Foundry tank plant, Strasburg Railroad, Bowser Manufacturing and more are in planning. For non-rail interests available are tours of Hershey, the Harrisburg State Capitol, the National Civil

War Museum and more. Space on tours is limited, so they are first come, first served.

Planned are some 30 +/- layout visitations as well as slots for many operators in scheduled operating sessions. Banquet, clinics, raffle, white elephant sale and a live auction round out the very busy schedule for this event. Of note is a beautiful Peter Lerro framed print of a PRR T-1 at the Harrisburg station to be given away to a lucky early registrant. Registration is now open and we look forward to seeing you in Harrisburg next October.



Building a Carolina Craftsman Kit Cape Fear Company House

After the 2016 mini-con at which I lead the Wood Structure Build-and-Take clinic featuring this Carolina Craftsman Kit (CCK) in HO-scale (pictured above), I was asked to write this article for the Wheel Report. I have assembled over 100 structure kits of various types (wood, styrene, resin, hydrocal, etc.) in N- through O-scales for about 15 years. I built the Cape Fear Company House in both HO- and O-scales, as well as other CCK structures.

CCK is Jeff Grove, a former member of South Mountain Division. CCK offers a nice selection of unique HO- and O-scale kits based on actual buildings. (http://www.carolinacraftsmankits.com) If you have never assembled a wooden structure kit, this is a good place to start. The kit is relatively inexpensive. It is a "craftsman kit," meaning that instructions are minimal, and aside from the laser-cut walls, one must cut and trim the included strip wood to fit and supplement the supplied materials. Do not let this be intimidating. Assembly is fairly straightforward!

Buildings like the company house were common during the 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> centuries at mining and timber operations, canneries, etc. They were inexpensive to construct and provided basic, no frills shelter for workers and their families. For a glimpse into a miners life, visit <u>Eckley Miners Village Museum</u>, near Hazleton, PA.

I find kits easier to assemble when I have an idea of the scene I want depicted. I try to find a visual reference from my travels, and from pictures on the internet. I keep in mind the era the structure will represent, its condition (new, used, dilapidated, etc), the geographic location, and the location on the layout. These factors affect the appearance of finished model. Examples: One would not expect to see a freshly painted structure at a long abandoned mine, or a cabin with a moss covered roof in a desert region. A structure close to the viewer requires more detail than a structure in the background. For this particular build, the structure will represent a company house in 1920s northeastern Pennsylvania. It will be situated close to the viewer, elevated on stilts, and show some neglect but with maintenance in progress.

In addition to the materials included in the kit, one will need the following tools and materials, most of which is available at Mainline Hobby Supply:

- Additional strip wood to supplement that included in the kit.
- Hobby knife with fresh #11 blades.
- Steel ruler/straight-edge.
- Clamps.
- Tweezers.
- Sanding sticks or file.
- Cutting pad.
- Toothpicks or micro-brush to apply the adhesive.
- Glue (I prefer <u>Aleene's Tacky Glue</u> or <u>Tite Bond II</u>).
- Paint, pastel chalks, <u>Hunterline Weathering Mixes</u>.

Take your time, learn, and enjoy the process. One can find many free videos on the internet that offer alternative methods to what I present in this article. **Step 1:** Inventory and inspect the included parts. This kit is packaged in a plastic zip-lock bag and contains a photograph of a completed structure, a line drawing of suggested configurations, the laser-cut siding, a bundle of strip wood, styrene window and door castings, and card stock for the roofing. Read the included instructions and understand how each piece fits.

**Step 2:** Using a sanding stick or file, true up the sides of the wall panels and all window and door openings. Lightly sand the gluing surfaces to remove any charred wood left over from the laser cutting process. *CAUTION: The wall panels are thin and somewhat fragile. Handle them with care!* 

**Step 3:** Remove the window and door castings from the sprue. Test fit the window and door castings and adjust the openings as needed. Apply a light coat of white primer to the castings.

Step 4: Earlier in this article I mentioned that I like to have a visual reference. For this build, I used the dilapidated former two-story company houses along



PA 997 between Mont Alto and Quincy.



To achieve this effect, stain the wall panels with Hunterline Light Gray Weathering Mix in a random pattern, then place the panels under a non-porous surface (e.g. glass) to keep them flat and allow them to dry overnight. At this time measure, cut and stain the four corner posts (scale 4" X 4" strip wood) for the building. NOTE: The wall panels in this kit are cut from scribed sheets of thin wood, which when painted or stained will warp. A modelers can choose from among many different methods for staining or painting wood structures. Some prefer to apply dry pigments (e.g. pastel chalks, Pan Pastel pigments), stains (alcohol/India ink, commercially available weathering mixes), or paint. All methods can yield a satisfactory result.

**Step 5:** Once the wall panels have dried, attach the corner posts to the ends of the building with <u>Aleene's Tacky Glue</u>. Apply the glue with a toothpick to the vertical edge of the end panels, being careful not to get glue on the face of the panels. Lay the panels face up on a flat surface to allow the glue to set.

Step 6: Again using Aleene's Tacky Glue, add vertical bracing to the interior of the wall panels leaving about 1/16-inch space at the top and


bottom of each panel.


On the long sides, place the bracing on the inside walls flush with the edges to provide additional gluing surface.



**Step 7:** After the bracing is in place and the glue has set, attach each end wall to one long wall, ensuring

the clapboard scribing of the long wall is correctly oriented. Use a square (I used some marble slabs) to achieve square joints. When the glue set, attach the pairs of sides to each other





**Step 8:** Apply one thin coat of paint (I used <u>Cottage White Hunterline Weathering Mix</u>) over the entire

exterior walls, and set the structure aside to dry. I applied a second coat to the bottom 5 feet of the structure to simulate maintenance in progress.


**Step 9:** A light coat of <u>Testor's Dullcote</u> turned the included acetate translucent. Cut the acetate to size and glue it in place inside the window frame using vary small amounts of <u>Aleene's Tacky Glue</u>. Once dry, glue the windows and door into the structure.

Step 10: Cut scale 6" x 6" strip wood so serve as stilts to elevate the structure. Glue these to the underside of the house.



**Step 11:** Slice the included roofing material into scale 3' x 40' strips. Starting at the eave, glue these strips to the sub-roof, overlapping each strip by a few scale inches. Lay a thin bead of <u>Aleene's Tacky Glue</u> over the seams of the 'tar paper' material to simulate tar sealant.

**Step 12:** Drill a hole in the roof for the chimney.



Paint the chimney black and attach it to the roof. Attach the roof to the building.

### T-Trak

Last spring the <u>Baltimore Area N-Trak</u> (BANTRAK) T-TRAK division set up it's N scale modular layout system *(below)* at our South Mountain Division (SMD) Mini Con.




Inspired by the rise in popularity of T-Trak [note the links and resources at the end of this article- ed.], and the ease of entry into our hobby due to the minimal financial investment, discussions prompted by Pete Clarke at subsequent division meetings led to a plan where the SMD will fund construction of the four corners necessary to create a full loop. The team of SMD members will also create pre-assembled straight section modules based on interest. These modules will be un-sceniced and provided at cost to all who make a reservation prior to the upcoming work session.

The SMD goal is to use the modular system as a form of outreach to novices. We will encourage participation by providing a clinic at the upcoming Mini Con, then allow NMRA members and guests to connect their modules to our layouts at future SMD events. This activity will also give experienced modelers a chance to explore new construction techniques, play with scenery and maybe explore a different scale all while showcasing their skills.

SMD member Paul Mahoney has researched the module design [similar to the following graphic -ed.].

The cost per 12x8" module, including <u>Kato Unitrack</u>, will be \$10. Double and triple length modules will be constructed if requested. A work session to create the four corners and straight sections will take place on March 19th. SMD member Bill Martz will lead a T-Trak related clinic at the 2017 Mini Con.

# **Layout Deconstruction**

I've had little interest in Shakespeare, but I have felt the "slings and arrows of outrageous fortune" when faced with tearing down my model railroad in 1996. I am facing tear down again soon at some unspecified date. It was October 15 last fall when The Frederick Rio Grande was scheduled for

disassembly but the layout got a reprieve.

So I asked other modelers how they dealt with the prospect of tearing down of their layouts. The responses surprised me. One fellow immediately

described it as "liberating." He was able to move on to his next project, which he has successfully done, in a more refined and prototypical manner than he could achieve with his old layout. Another modeler with an extensive layout said

"To tear or not to tear down
- that is the question Whether 'tis nobler in the mind for the
layout to never suffer disassembly
Or to take aim upon a new quest to model
the railroad as it should be."

(adapted, with apologies, from Shakespeare's, Hamlet, Act III, Scene 1)

members had three separate layouts and was moving to a new city. Only one layout was going with him. He described the pangs of loss at the prospect of a front loader at the landfill destroying his well-crafted sectional tables with their fine finished red cedar lumber legs. I think we agree we all put a considerable amount of ourselves into our model creations. So you can imagine he felt a part of himself was being thrown into the abyss.

Our west-bound SMD member's third layout was designed for relocation and it did make the move and now sits in his dining room. He has new plans for it too. But his account brought back painful memories of my own when I faced tear down with little prospect of rebuilding. **The Pheasant Valley Rio Grande** occupied a fully finished 14x20' room in the basement before it was disassembled in Ohio to move to a new house. Although it had been designed into heavy 30x60" modules, the layout needed the same dimensional space to re-assemble and this was

not available at the new house. I couldn't bear that the modules suffer further disassembly, so I couldn't get inspired to take aim upon a new quest. A chapter closed on my life and it was 17 years before I laid rails again.

he actually enjoyed the fellowship as his friends came together to help him dismantle the old layout. And he even relished a quasi-ceremonial burning of the lumber that wasn't to be salvaged.

The essential part of both of these stories is the commitment to a new layout. These modelers kept their vision "to see the other side" and immediately started new layouts. I believe it inspired renewed vigor within them. But what if you face disassembly and do not have a plan to rebuild. One of our

But my story rejoins the reinvigorated modelers that started this article when I too had the opportunity to envision a new layout. That was the result of moving to Frederick four years ago. I had a practically empty house! I started with a simple shelf railroad concept and just kept finding ways to build into all the space. Like old Rip Van Winkle, my 20 year-old locomotives came out of their boxes, sans decoders, with their ancient gear drives and mediocre wheels.

Basic <u>TCS T-Series decoders</u> got them back in the game, but they were soon retired when I discovered how great new models are. Whining diesel sound and chuffing steamers! So I have enjoyed the renewed vigor as well.

One trait I have learned that I do share with other modelers nearing the tear down is that we ignore the end is coming. Maybe this is a coping mechanism. My one friend was still ballasting track two weeks before he knew his tear down had to begin! Likewise, I put off the start of disassembly of my layout by a week last fall, and in that week, I got an employment extension that has kept me in Frederick. The Frederick Rio Grande lives on and has extended 30 feet of mainline since then (half a scale mile!). I keep building and ignoring fate. Similarly, our west-bound SMD member held off taking his two layouts to the landfill and eventually found appreciative recipients to take them. In S-gauge no less. Miracles do happen!

Alas, when I eventually return to Ohio, my wife is adamant there will be no railroad in the living room (in the way that The Frederick Rio Grande now occupies). So I will face the agony of tear down. Total scrapping, no modules to recover. Just bringing track and lumber to Ohio. I expect another chapter of model railroading to close. But not completely. Joining the SMD has opened up a new faucet to the hobby that I never participated in before, the fellowship of other modelers. So I am going to find a modular group to join in Ohio, and participate in events and the NMRA conventions. In that sense, my next layout is going to be really, really big!
