William H. (Bill) Miller, MMR

On January 29th the model railroad hobby lost one of its most enthusiastic proponents, Bill (Tiger Bob) Miller. Bill was a fount of knowledge about our hobby and could talk for hours about almost any facet of it. Most often he spoke of his favorite things; railroad history, scenery, scratch building, and his much-loved Colorado and Southern. This interest stemmed from the time he spent in Colorado, both professionally and as a hobbyist, researching the narrow gauge railroads and the C&S in particular.

In partnership with his MMR wife Mary, he developed the Idea to build a railroad that the prototype planned but never built, the C&S Ohio Creek Extension. The resulting On3 railroad models an area from Gunnison to Floresta via Baldwin and Kebler Pass with a branch to Ruby. As a team their skills combined well. Bill's well-developed skills in scenery, scratchbuilding and rolling stock highly complimented Mary's abilities with trackwork and locomotive construction. The result is a superb model railroad that has been widely featured in the hobby press. It is one of the few railroads that operates as well as it looks, and as you may have seen, it is gorgeous. Operating under the timetable/train order system, it frequently operates for months at a time without so much as a derailment.

As a modeler, Bill won many awards both nationally and regionally and was recognized

by the NMRA as a Master Model Railroader. He loved to share his modeling knowledge and photographic skills and has been widely published in the model press. His byline has appeared often over the last 40 years in Model Railroader, The Narrow Gauge and Short Line Gazette, Railroad Model Craftsman and the NMRA Magazine.



William H. (Bill) Miller, MMR July 22, 1939 – January 29, 2018

In addition to a keen interest in Model Railroading, Bill had an impact in a much wider arena. A proud member of the Screen Actors Guild, he was the top radio "morning man," in the Baltimore/Washington market known as "Tiger Bob Raleigh." His long and extremely successful career in radio was topped off with two Country Music Awards recognizing his excellence.

Bill also had a wide range of personal interests. An avid collector of old movies and radio memorabilia, you would never want to challenge him at trivia. In his younger days Bill spent years of weekends riding the rodeo circuit throughout the US and Canada, performing in such disparate venues as the New Jersey rodeos, the Calgary Stampede, Denver Cattle Show, and many, many more. Bull riding was his favorite event, and he had the scars to prove it. A long-time devoted fan of the Baltimore Orioles, his wife and son even purchased a treasured pair of his favorite seats from Municipal Stadium as a gift when Oriole Park at Camden Yards was opened.

Radio personality, rodeo rider, CMA winner, dedicated US Marine, Orioles fan, historian, railroad modeler -- Bill was all these things and more. He is survived by his loving wife, Mary Synowiec Miller and one son, Michael Marc Miller. His modeling friends and family will long remember and sorely miss his outstanding sense of humor and warm, willing friendship.



Rebuilding Somerset on the P&SP


I've been yard master at Somerset on the HO scale Pittsburgh & South Pennsylvania (P&SP) for over two years, since Superintendent Don Florwick decided to operate under Time Table / Train Order. Prior to this, the area that is now Somerset yard had been a staging yard representing Harrisburg PA. Before TT/TO the modeled portion of the line ended at a tunnel at the top of the grade east of Jacobs Creek.

With his decision to go with TT/TO rules, Don extended the operational

portion of his mainline, modeling a fictional P&SP yard located in Somerset PA. Harrisburg was then combined with a staging area that had previously represented only the Pittsburgh (west) end of the line. That yard, being double

ended, allows trains to Harrisburg to re-emerge as trains from Pittsburgh and vice versa.

Moving forward, what had been Harrisburg staging became the new Somerset yard. The track arrangement was able to handle it's new assignment, but it was less than ideal. There was plenty of trackage, just too much in the wrong places. The mainline ran along the wall. There were four leads on the west end and no engine terminal for the coal extras that originated and terminated at Somerset. The yard throat was unnecessarily complicated and required a rather confusing control panel to operate its myriad powered switches. It was a sea of trackage, as one would expect of a former staging area for 20+ car trains, with little or no room for scenery. Goals were to simplify the trackage, rearrange the yard to look more like what one might find in a moderate sized central PA town, and eliminate the majority of powered switches in favor of ground throws. It was also discovered that there was a possibility for adding an interchange!


After a hiatus of a month or so, Somerset is back in action in its new form. The complex control panel is gone. The operational portion of the yard has been moved to the west end so as to alleviate aisle congestion when a crew is switching Scottsdale *[located directly below Somerset on a*]

lower deck- Ed.]. Industry is at the east of the yard, but only worked every third operating

session, or once a day. A wye and engine terminal with a service facility have been added along with a Western Maryland three track interchange. The classification tracks are now double ended permitting them to be switched **Rebuilding Somerset on the P&SP**

from either end. There is a thoroughfare track around the back side of the yard, and the main, with a passing siding, are along the isle.

The new yard has been in use for two sessions and has so far proved satisfactory, both operationally as well as fun to work. Several adjustments have been made to improve the current track design based on those two sessions. The wye now connects directly to the siding alongside the main as well as to the thoroughfare track. A long runaround in the industrial area has been eliminated in favor of something shorter alongside the yard ladder, and several sidings have been adjusted for appearance.

Citadel Snapshot | T-TRAK Modules

Where there's railroading, there's detritus. You've seen it by the tracks, and piled around any shop building. It's an escapable aspect of industry and loading docks everywhere. That's right, I'm talking about crates, barrels, pallets, and junk beyond description. In this issue, we're going to review how to quickly make this essential fine-detailing look the part in three simple steps- prime, basecoat, and wash.



To begin with, I've taken a selection of plastic, metal, and wood fine-detailing bits purchased off the

racks at Mainline Hobby Supply. These have been primed with a Tamiya spray primer. I do not advise painting directly over a bare surface; your paint needs something to stick to.

Below, I've basecoated them with a variety of Citadel Base and Layer type paints. The exact colors do not matter for this, and the more subtle variety you can include, the better! I would recommend looking in the corners of your preferred reference photos for inspiration.



Finally, I've used the Citadel MVPs, the Shade range, to add grit and depth to these items. I've actually applied only two Shades: Nuln Oil and

left out in the elements, or muck up an entire scrapyard's worth of junk piles. The sky's the limit- or should I say, the mud is?



Agrax Earthshade, the black and brown Shades, respectively. Because Shade behaves as both a stain and a wash, it makes junk feel right at home in back alleys or next to RIP tracks. You don't need to be bashful when applying Shade, either; go ahead and mop in on with a large brush. Besides making sure to prevent pools from forming, you literally cannot apply too much at once.

And there you have it! This method could easily be scaled up to dirty MOW equipment

A word on pots of glossy Citadel Shade.

When purchasing a pot of Shade, make sure you DON'T pick up its "Gloss" equivalent. Although those pots are marked "Gloss", it's still easy to grab the wrong one, especially if somebody else returned a pot of "Gloss" to the normal "Shade" row. Furthermore, occasional bad batches of Shade have made it into circulation, which dry with a distinct satin finish. If you end up with one of these, I would suggest attempting to return or exchange it.

Citadel Snapshot | T-TRAK Modules

What is the <u>Citadel paint range</u>?

Citadel is made by the UK tabletop wargaming miniatures manufacturer <u>Games Workshop</u> for use with their own products. Developed as a complete system meant for gaming pieces, Citadel paints are water wash-up and formulated with a thick pigment meant to cover any surface with no more than two coats, dry within minutes, and withstand handling without wearing off.

The range comes in several different types of paints, as well: "Layer," meant for normal applications, "Base," with extra-thick pigment meant for base-coating, "Shade," a thin translucent formula which stains and shades, "Dry," with super-thick pigment meant for drybrushing, "Air," which is largely Layer and Base colors meant for use with an airbrush, and "Technical," which are custom formulas meant for a variety of effects such as brass oxidation and thick mud.

The way I understand it, a few years ago, there was an idea: South Mountain Division would create a <u>T-Trak</u> module for public display at our Mini-Con. The concept behind T-Trak is simple: it's small, which makes it easy to build, store, and t r a n s p o r t.



Furthermore, it's plug-and-play; theoretically, anyone from the public could add a module to our display, and our members could take their modules to displays at other shows. Finally, we could sell the modules to members of the public interested in creating their own.

That was the idea, the way I understand it, at least. What I know is that many of you volunteered to take modules home and get them ready for the Mini-Con, headed up by our own Ken Mazer. The plan, as it stands, is to use the Division's modules to showcase our member's talents.

In Ken's case (above), he's added extra trackwork to his module for additional switching opportunity. On my modules, I'll be using foam to create rock

cuts.

The purpose of T-Trak isn't for every module to match the others; it's for you to showcase what you're capable of. So, if you have a module (or you'd like to take a crack at one), show our Mini-Con attendees what you can do!

Motive power and rolling stock will be provided for the Mini-Con. If you would prefer to leave your module with the Division, it will be collected for storage after the Mini-Con.

If you'd like to match the color Ken used on his fascia, he's provided the paint info (right) for the Division's use.
